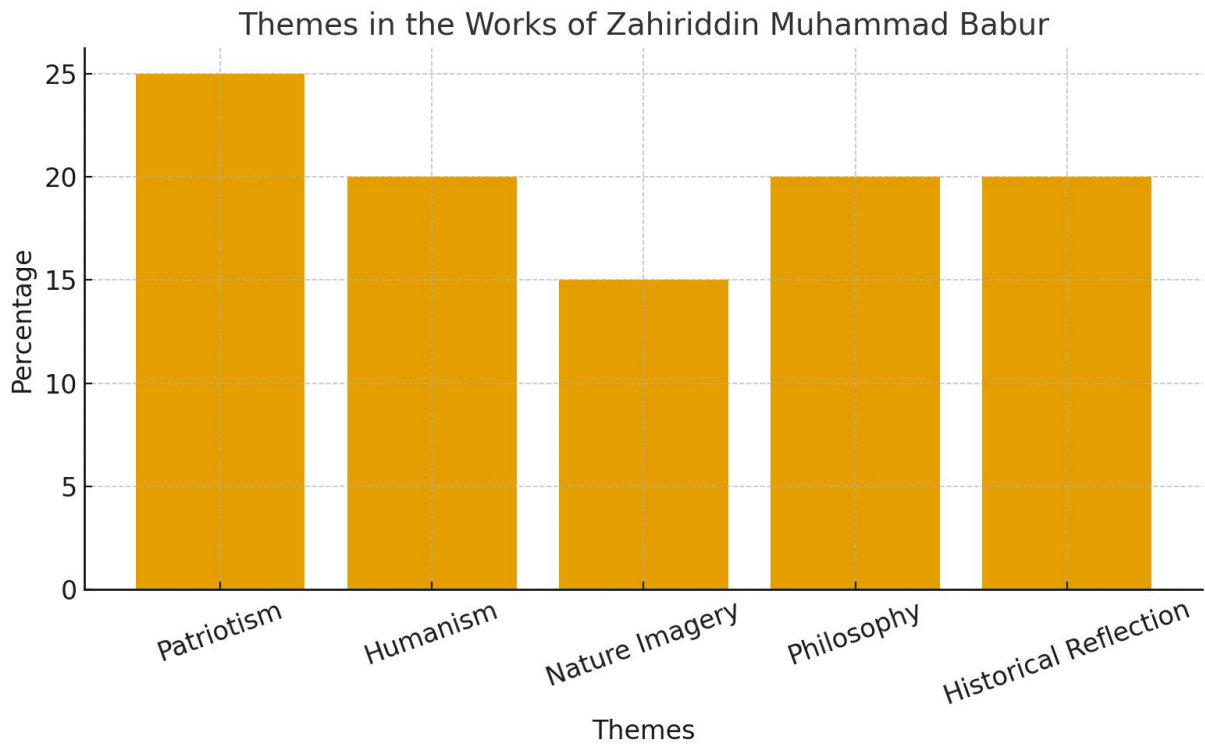

- Nature imagery (15%) — detailed and poetic descriptions of landscapes, mountains, rivers, and gardens.
- Philosophy (20%) — contemplation of life, fate, and moral values.
- Historical reflection (20%) — analysis of political events, leadership, and the quest for justice.

Babur's literary heritage represents a synthesis of personal experience, philosophical depth, and national identity. His works serve as a bridge between history and art, combining emotional sincerity with intellectual insight — a legacy that continues to shape modern Uzbek and world literature.
