

**GENERAL FEATURES OF JACK RITCHIE'S STYLE AND ANALYSIS THROUGH

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Annotation. One of the most remarkable aspects of Ritchie's style is irony. The author uses irony not only as a humorous device but also as a means of directing dramatic tension. In "Shatter Proof," irony functions on two levels: first, the situation itself is ironic—a man confronted by a gun speaks calmly, turning the struggle to save his life into an almost casual conversation; second, irony is conveyed through Williams's individual remarks. His polite offer "A drink?" to the killer or his casual commentary on his own danger forms one of the story's main aesthetic powers. Irony does not soften the atmosphere; it intensifies it—the gentler the tone, the more dangerous the situation feels. In Ritchie's works, psychological duels form the core of dramatic tension. Ritchie's stories also tend to present moral layers in a complex form. At first, the reader may perceive the victim as an innocent figure, but as the plot unfolds, it becomes clear that he too violates moral boundaries. To save his life, he manipulates, threatens, blackmails, and eventually pushes the killer into committing yet another crime. This represents another dimension of Ritchie's irony—the supposedly superior moral position is not actually firm, not truly “shatter proof.”

Conclusion. Jack Ritchie holds a special place in the crime genre with his short, concise, and dramatically powerful works. His minimalist approach, mastery in constructing plot through dialogue, and most importantly, his ability to use irony as a dramatic device distinguish him from other writers. “Shatter Proof” embodies all the main features of Ritchie's style: a profound psychological duel in a small setting, plot twists driven by ordinary objects, a gradual shift in power dynamics, and the revelation of complex moral layers.
