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Annotation

**СПОСОБЫ ИСПОЛЬЗОВАНИЯ НАРОДНЫХ СКАЗОК В ДОШКОЛЬНЫХ
ОБРАЗОВАТЕЛЬНЫХ УЧРЕЖДЕНИЯХ**

Аннотация

Данное исследование рассматривает способы использования народных сказок в дошкольных образовательных учреждениях и их влияние на всестороннее развитие детей. Practical Strategies for Folktale Use in Preschool Settings

While folktales offer multifaceted benefits, their effective use requires thoughtful implementation. Educators must select age-appropriate stories and adapt them to contemporary values, avoiding outdated stereotypes. Teacher training is crucial to facilitate meaningful discussions linking traditional narratives to children’s daily experiences. Additionally, balancing cultural heritage with inclusivity ensures that stories reflect diverse backgrounds without promoting bias. Folktales are significant educational resources in preschool settings, offering rich opportunities for language development, moral education, cultural awareness, and emotional growth⁶. When strategically integrated, folktale-based activities enrich the educational environment and support holistic child development. Their multifaceted nature — combining cultural heritage with pedagogical utility — makes folktales indispensable for early childhood education, preparing children not only academically but socially and ethically for their future educational journeys.

The integration of folktales into preschool education requires thoughtful planning, structured implementation, and creative methods to engage children actively. Educators can employ various strategies to maximize the educational potential of folktales, ensuring that language, cognitive, social, and emotional skills are effectively nurtured. Storytelling remains the most traditional and effective way to introduce folktales to young children. Teachers use voice modulation, facial expressions, gestures, and pacing to capture attention and convey narrative meaning⁷. A well-told story stimulates imagination, encourages active listening, and introduces new vocabulary in context. Research indicates that children who regularly participate in guided storytelling demonstrate stronger listening comprehension and verbal expression compared to those who do not. To enhance engagement, teachers may incorporate questions during storytelling, prompting children to predict outcomes or reflect on character

Integration across disciplines encourages children to connect the narrative to multiple experiences, deepening comprehension and promoting holistic development. Beyond cognitive skills, folktales play a critical role in transmitting cultural values and moral lessons. Educators can select stories that emphasize empathy, cooperation, honesty, and respect for diversity.
